## MY FIRST LONDON HOME

The theatre producer of Mamma Mial talks to Jane Slade about why, despite owning homes in New York and Warwickshire, she will always consider London home

I grew up in leafy Mill Hill, which I thought was the countryside. Our house was in the grounds of Mill Hill school so I had the run of a swimming pool and tennis courts in the holidays - and a horse which I kept nearby.

I won a place at the Guildhall School of Music to study stage management. That's when I really fell in love with London.

I camped on the floor of friends' flats in Elephant and Castle. I would wake up to find my Mini had no wheels, but I didn't care - I loved being near to the action.

My first London job was working on the musical Cats. I camped in a huge shared house in South Kensington. When the show finished I would head down to Joe Allen in Covent Garden and order a plate of chips and a Harvey

Wallbanger, unless Wayne Sleep, who played Mr Mistoffelees, treated me to supper, which he often did.

I then went to work as production Tim Rice's assistant on the musical Chess. That is when I met Björn and Benny. It was then that I became quite obsessed by ABBA's fabulous songs.

Around this time I bought my first home, a tiny flat, in St Ann's Villas in Holland Park for £28,000. It really bordered Shepherd's Bush. It was there that I started to develop the idea of Mamma Mia! the musical and drove the neighbours mad playing ABBA songs 24/7.

The flat was covered in Post-It notes of ideas for the musical. Tina Turner lived close by. I'd had an idea that she could

so soon. My parents loved Mamma

play one of the leads and posted a note through her door. I got a stern note from her manager asking me never to do that again!

I loved that flat. It was close to Notting Hill, there was a great buzz in the area and it holds many happy memories. I had to sell the flat to give up my job and concentrate on the making of the musical.

After Mamma Mia! opened in London in 1999, then in Toronto and finally Broadway, I moved to SW3. I never imagined the stage show

would be so successful, and get me back on the property ladder

Mia! Happily, my mother lived to see some of its success around the world. I had showed her the shiny brochure of this beautiful Georgian house in Egerton Crescent that I wanted to buy; and told her not to tell anyone how much it cost.

At my mother's funeral her friends said to me "We hear you've bought a house for £5 million". That made me smile and the first thing I did was throw a garden party for them.

Mamma Mia! has now been seen by over 60 million people worldwide. With productions in over 440 cities, lugging suitcases up and down five storeys got to me in the end so just before we filmed Mamma Mia! The Movie on Skopelos in 2007 I moved to an

apartment in Belgravia. It is ten minutes from my office. I know the local shop owners and they know me and I can walk everywhere.

I have houses in New York and Warwickshire, London will always be home. I still love going to the theatre and eating out late. I love The Delaunay, and Colbert in Sloane Square is one of my favourite cafés.

The failure of VIVA FOREVER! [the Spice Girls' musical] did hit me hard when it closed three years ago. But without it closing I would not have rediscovered my passion for horses and become an ambassador for British show jumping.

Of all the ABBA songs, The Winner Takes It All was my inspiration for Mamma Mia! After all these years I still love dancing round the kitchen to Dancing Queen, often at 2am!
